Klamath Crimson Rose currently is serving a youth that is 13 years old and falls outside of current license age range of 14-20. Klamath Crimson Rose had just changed from their previous age range of 13-17 at their recent license renewal. "Debriefed with both Dan Golden and Steve Quick regarding either an individual exception for the new 13-year-old in program or changing their age range on license. Crimson Rose reported they will file paperwork with their licensor Ed Wyller." Interview Summary

I met with three of the four youth currently at Crimson Rose in the gym off the classroom (independently to ensure their privacy). One youth chose not to speak with me due to prior interactions with DHS that were not positive for her. On a scale from 0-10 where (0=worst program, 10=best program) youth ranked Crimson Rose a 5, 8, and 8.5. The youth ranking it a 5 reported if she could change anything about the program it would be for family visits. At this time Oregon Youth Authority is not allowing family visits and youth reported she talks with her family daily via telephone. All youth indicated feeling safe at Crimson Rose. All youth reported being in treatment groups three times a day during the week and two times a day on weekends. Youth reported learning how to control anger, refusal skills for drugs or alcohol, and coping skills. Youth spoke highly of the education component of the program. One youth reports she just passed her GED and that she thought this was not possible before coming to Crimson Rose. All three youth reported the food to be good. Youth reported the following outings in the community: garden, park, Lake of the Woods, library, and various fast food and stores (Dairy Queen, Subway, Wendy's, Dominos, McDonald's and Dutch Bros). Youth reported being active in the gym doing workouts with jump ropes, video's, leg bands, and having fun working out together. Youth also reported spending time watching tv, reading, and talking with each other. One youth reported the "days go fast here". Another reported "feel like is good to help you set goals". Staff were described as respectful. One youth came back to talk to me. She wanted to let me know about a grievance she is working on with the program. During my debrief with Crimson Rose management they reported they have been working with the youth and the particular staff member and are monitoring to ensure it is addressed.

Observations

I started my tour with Dan Golden Klamath County Juvenile Department Director. During the tour it was noted the building to be clean and organized. Youth and staff were all wearing masks and maintaining social distancing. I observed the newly built classroom. The classroom was just completed one month ago. Lottery dollars were awarded to create a new classroom in what was previously unused storage space. Prior to the completion of the new classroom youth would conduct class in the dayroom on unit. In the dayroom I observed the newly created GED wall. When youth attain their GED certificates, they can choose to add their name to the GED wall. I observed teachers, direct care staff, and Crimson Rose Administrators interacting with the youth in a positive caring manner. During my visit to the classroom the program highlighted a recent accomplishment of a youth just attaining her GED.

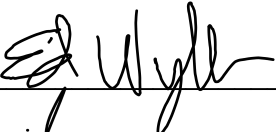
